This is the highest return rate of any follow up, so hats off to each of you! Special thanks to SELF staff, as well, who rearranged schedules and made it happen!

Study Update

STUDY OF ENVIRONMENT, LIFESTYLE & FIBROIDS

As of August 31, 2018:

- 1530 (90%) participants completed all Follow-Up 3 activities.
 - 96 participants that missed Follow-Up 2 returned to complete Follow-Up 3
 - 34 participants that missed both Follow-Up 1 & 2 returned to complete Follow-Up 3
- 96% of all distributed Early Life Questionnaires have been returned. If you did not return one and need another sent to you, please let us know.
- SELF staff in North Carolina are currently organizing the SELF data so we can begin to look for answers to our questions about fibroids. Having 90% of you complete the 3rd follow-up is important for the next analysis phase. **THANK YOU!**



Flu Season!

The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) recommends annual flu shots for you and your children. Babies younger than 6 months should not get shots, but if everyone around them is vaccinated, the risk of getting the flu goes down for them too. If it is a first-time flu vaccination for 8-year-olds and younger, they'll require two shots for protection.

HPV Vaccine Age Extension: Boys to Age 21, Girls to Age 26

Human papilloma virus (HPV) refers to a group of over 100 viruses. Most infections are cleared within 2 years of the initial infection, but some persist to cause cancer (cancer of mouth/throat, anus/rectum in both men and women, cancer of cervix, vagina, and vulva in women and cancer of penis in men). Thirteen HPV types have been identified as cancercausing types. The virus is most often spread from one person to another through oral, vaginal, or anal sex. Most infections result in no symptoms, so many people who have an HPV infection are not aware of being exposed.

HPV vaccine has been developed to prevent infection by the viral types most likely to cause cancer, thus preventing many cancers. The current vaccine is active against 11 of the identified 13 high-risk HPV types. The CDC recommends that kids 11 or 12 years old get the protective vaccine (2 shots given 6-12 months apart), but it is available for children as early as age 9. The aim is for the vaccine to stimulate the development of immunity before young people are exposed. Then the infection will be prevented by the immune system. The vaccine does not treat existing infections.

Children and young adults who have not received the properly-timed doses by age 12 should get vaccinated as soon as possible to prevent future cancer. Upper age limits in the United States have now been extended to 21 for boys and 26 for girls. By these ages many men and women will already have been exposed to several HPV types and if the infection is cleared, will have built up immunity to them. However, individuals older than the age limit might also benefit from the vaccine and can often obtain it, but costs would rarely be covered by insurance.

When Serena Williams shared her story of life-threatening blood clots forming after her C-section for baby Olympia, it alerted many women to this problem. CDC now has lots of helpful information on their website, including a checklist of factors in addition to C-section that increase your risk:

- twin pregnancies,
- being pregnant at 35 or older,
- smoking,

- being overweight,
- or conditions such as diabetes.

A Look Back: *SELF Highlights*

SELF is a huge success because of dedicated participants like you. Thank you for staying actively involved over the past 5 years. Here's a look back at SELF milestones and highlights.

Enrollment

SELF began recruiting and enrolling in October 2010, and ended in September 2012. The study achieved its targeted enrollment goal with a total of 1693 participants completing enrollment activities.

Follow-Up 1

SELF kicked off the first follow-up clinic visits and activities in October 2012, and ended in December 2014 with 1477 (87%) of enrolled women completing all Follow-Up 1 activities.

Follow-Up 2

Follow-Up 2 began in June 2014, and ended in September 2016 with 1438 (85%) of enrolled women completing the second follow-up.

Follow-Up 3

The study kicked off the third phase of followup activities in March 2016, and ended August 2018 with 1530 (90%) of women completing study activities. This was the highest return rate out of any of the follow ups. Many thanks to you!!
